**DONALD T. STERLING
CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD AND OWNER**

Donald T. Sterling ranks among the longest-tenured NBA owners, and is one of the few remaining sole owners of a professional sports franchise in any league. He enters his 29th season as Owner and Chairman of the Board of the Clippers.

It was Sterling's vision which resulted in the construction of the \$50 million Los Angeles Clippers' Training Center in Playa Vista, which houses the team's practice and training facility, as well as office space to accommodate the Clippers' Basketball Operations staff. (for more information on the LACTC, see page 284)

His areas of expertise are diverse and many: he has been a prominent attorney, real estate developer, and entrepreneur. Add to that his efforts in community involvement and philanthropy, so clearly evidenced by his active role in support of over 170 charities providing direct benefit to the lives of tens of thousands of young people throughout the Greater Los Angeles metropolitan area. During the 2008-09 season over 550 organizations received in excess of 80,000 tickets for local children and their families through the Donald T. Sterling Charity Seats Program. Sterling has donated over 280,000 tickets to more than 2,000 community groups over the last seven seasons.

Sterling was the driving force in the formation of the Los Angeles Clippers Foundation, which benefits numerous local charities. During the 2006 off-season, Sterling spearheaded the creation of a series of free, day-long, Clippers' summer basketball clinics to involve local youth. Since the program's inception, over 6,500 youth have participated in the clinics which have taken place at various parks and recreation centers throughout the Los Angeles area.

He has received many honors, including the 2009 NAACP Lifetime Achievement Award, the 2008 BBA Humanitarian of the Year Award, the 2008 NAACP President's Award, the 2006 Say Yes to Children Network Children's Hero Award, the 1999 MDA Dennis Day Memorial Award, the 1998 Los Angeles Yeshiva Golden Menorah Humanitarian of the Year Award, the Asthma & Allergy Foundation 1998 Humanitarian of the Year Award, the Vista Del Mar Orphanage 1997 Man of the Year and the Gold Medal Humanitarian of the Year by the Special Olympics.

He was also named Humanitarian of the Year by the Los Angeles Police Historical Society at its 1999 Jack Webb Award gala. Funds generated by the event went toward the construction of the Los Angeles Police History and Community Education Center, a multi-purpose facility designed to pay tribute to those who have fallen in the line of duty and serve as a community center for at-risk youth, an interactive LAPD Museum, and an LAPD sub-station.

Sterling was born in Chicago and raised in the Boyle Heights section of Los Angeles, earning his entire education in the area, from high school to law school - where he graduated with cum laude honors. He began his career as a lawyer before turning to investments, sports and entertainment in Southern California.

He took over ownership of the Clippers' franchise in 1981 when the team was located in San Diego. He re-located the club to his hometown in 1984. It was his influence which stimulated yet another move prior to the 1999-2000 season, this time just a few blocks up Figueroa Street. That season the team began playing in the magnificent new STAPLES Center in downtown Los Angeles.

Sterling is the managing partner of a law firm and Chairman of Sterling Properties. He and his family reside in Beverly Hills and Malibu.

**ANDY ROESER
PRESIDENT AND NBA ALTERNATE GOVERNOR**

One of the longest tenured executives in the National Basketball Association, Los Angeles Clippers President and NBA Alternate Governor Andy Roeser has spent the last 25 years shaping the Clippers into one of the most exciting and fan friendly franchises on the Los Angeles sports landscape, as his forward and innovative thinking have helped build the Clippers into a competitive team focused on a return to the NBA Playoffs.

Roeser did his part to kick-start the 2009 Clippers' offseason when he represented the organization at the NBA Lottery and came home with the first overall selection in the 2009 NBA Draft and the right to select consensus collegiate player of the year, Blake Griffin. After the draft, the Clippers' offseason roster overhaul continued with the acquisitions of Rasual Butler, Sebastian Telfair and Craig Smith. An expert in dealing with NBA salary cap issues, Roeser negotiates all player contracts and added a total of four new players to the returning nucleus of two-time All-Star Baron Davis, two-time All-NBA Defensive Team member Marcus Camby, explosive second year guard Eric Gordon emerging third-year forward Al Thornton and steady contributor Chris Kaman.

Roeser was also the driving force behind the extraordinary Los Angeles Clippers Training Center in Playa Vista which opened prior to the start of the 2008-09 campaign, serving as the point man for all aspects in the development and construction of the 42,500 square foot state-of-the-art facility that immediately took its place as one of the best in all of professional sports.

In addition, Roeser continues to raise the Clippers local profile, negotiating a new long-term exclusive broadcast rights agreement with PRIME TICKET as well as a multi-year radio agreement with KFVB 980 AM.

In charge of all facets of the team and business operations as President since 1986, Roeser started as the club's Executive Vice President after joining the Clippers in 1984 from the accounting firm of Ernst & Young.

The President of the Los Angeles Clippers Foundation since its inception in 1994, Roeser also serves on the boards of the Los Angeles Sports Council and the Advisory Board for the Graduate Program in Sports Management at Cal State University, Long Beach.

The 50-year old Michigan native is a graduate of Michigan State University and resides in Long Beach with his wife Anne and their two children, Drew and Stephanie.

MIKE DUNLEAVY
GENERAL MANAGER AND HEAD COACH

Mike Dunleavy begins his second season in the dual-role of General Manager and Head Coach and seventh season as the head coach of the Clippers. Dunleavy is now the third most tenured of all active coaches in the NBA, trailing only Utah's Jerry Sloan and San Antonio's Gregg Popovich. Despite a difficult 2008-09 season that saw the Clippers lose the fourth-most games to injury and illness in the NBA (233 games), Dunleavy helped develop a group of promising young players, including guiding first round selection Eric Gordon to become one of the most exciting rookies in the league in 2008. Long known as one of the hardest working and most dynamic coaches in the league, Dunleavy overhauled the Clippers roster prior to the start of the 2009-10 season with the additions of consensus collegiate player of the year Blake Griffin, swingman Rasual Butler, point guard Sebastian Telfair, and forwards Craig Smith and Mark Madsen. Dunleavy became the

Clippers all-time franchise leader in victories when he won his 159th game on Dec. 7, 2007, surpassing Dr. Jack Ramsay. Dunleavy's 492 games on the Clippers sideline is the most games coached in club history, as he passed Ramsay (1972-76) and Bill Fitch (1994-98) on Nov. 2, 2007. A 16-year NBA coaching veteran, Dunleavy now ranks eighth among active coaches on the all-time NBA victory list, and is 21st on the all-time NBA wins list. Dunleavy has coached 1,280 career NBA games, the seventh most among active coaches and the 17th most games of any coach in NBA history. Dunleavy led the Clippers to within one game of the Western Conference Finals in 2006 and won his 500th career game as a coach on March 13, 2006. Dunleavy coached his 1,000th career game during the 2005-06 season. The Clippers improved in each of Dunleavy's first three seasons on the bench, increasing their win total from 28 wins in 2003-04 to 47 wins during the 2005-06 campaign. In 2005-06, Dunleavy guided the Clippers to their best record since the franchise moved to California and to their first playoff appearance in nine seasons. Prior to joining the Clippers, Dunleavy guided the Portland Trail Blazers for four seasons (1997-2001), leading them to a 190-106 (.642) record and four straight playoff appearances. Under Dunleavy, the Blazers made two consecutive trips to the Western Conference Finals in 1999 and 2000 with the 1999-00 club winning 59 games, matching the second-best victory total in Blazers history. Dunleavy earned the 1999 NBA Coach of the Year award after leading the 1998-99 Blazers to a Pacific Division-winning 35-15 record. Dunleavy's first head coaching opportunity came with the Los Angeles Lakers in 1990-91, when he led them to a 58-24 record and a berth in the NBA Finals, where they lost in five games to the Chicago Bulls. During the Lakers' run through the 1991 NBA Playoffs, Los Angeles defeated Houston (3-0), Golden State (4-1) and upset Portland (4-2) in the Western Conference Finals, after the Blazers had posted the league's best regular season record (63-19) and two straight NBA Finals appearances. The following year, the Lakers posted a 43-39 record and dropped a first-round series to Portland. Dunleavy moved on in 1992 to Milwaukee, where he compiled a 107-221 (.326) record over four seasons while holding the dual title of Vice President of Basketball Operations and Head Coach. He stepped away from the bench prior to the 1996-97 season to concentrate on his general manager duties with the Bucks for one season before taking the head job in Portland. Selected in the sixth round (99th pick overall) by Philadelphia in 1976, Dunleavy played 11 seasons in the NBA with career averages of 8.0 points and 3.9 assists in 438 games. He played for Philadelphia (1976-78), Houston (1978-82), San Antonio (1982-83) and Milwaukee (1983-85, 1988-1990). During the 1980-81 campaign, Dunleavy averaged a career-best 10.5 points as a starting guard for a Rockets team that reached the NBA Finals. In his lone season in San Antonio, Dunleavy led the NBA in three-point percentage, connecting at a .345 (67-194) clip from behind the arc. A back injury prompted his unofficial retirement following the 1984-85 season and he worked for a New York investment firm before returning to the NBA as an assistant coach with Milwaukee for the 1986-87 season. He stayed on the Bucks' bench through the 1989-90 campaign, but returned to uniform in parts of two seasons (1988-89, 1989-90) when injuries to the Bucks' backcourt forced Dunleavy into the lineup. A native of Brooklyn, N.Y., Dunleavy played collegiately at the University of South Carolina, where he finished his career as the school's third all-time leading scorer with 1,586 points. He appeared in 111 consecutive games for the Gamecocks, starting his last 105. Dunleavy was a straight A student, majoring in psychology while at South Carolina. He played his prep basketball at Nazareth High School in Brooklyn, where he earned All-New York City honors as a senior and had his number 44 jersey retired. Mike and his wife Emily have three sons: Michael, Jr. (Indiana Pacers), William Baker and James (USC).

NEIL OLSHEY ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Neil Olshey enters his second season as Assistant General Manager, after serving the previous three campaigns in the role of Director of Player Personnel. The 2009-10 season marks Olshey's seventh overall season with the team after joining the Clippers as Director of Player Development prior to the start of the 2003-04 season and serving as an assistant coach during the 2004-05 campaign. Prior to joining the Clippers, Olshey served as Director of Player Development for SFX Sports Group, Inc. where he created, organized and conducted Pre Draft and Off Season Training Camps for future and current NBA players. The Pre Draft Camps produced 15 Lottery picks, 25 First Round selections and 57 NBA players. Participants in Olshey's Off Season skill development clinics include more than 85 current NBA players including numerous All-Stars and All-NBA selections.

He has also served as a Head Coach/Clinician at the Reebok ABCD Camp, the Roundball Classic and numerous NCAA basketball camps throughout the country.

Upon graduation from LeMoine College in 1987 he was honored with the "Outstanding Senior Athlete" Award. Neil and his wife Leslie reside in Manhattan Beach with their sons Connor and James.



GARY SACKS DIRECTOR OF SCOUTING/ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Gary Sacks begins his fifth season as Director of Scouting/Assistant Director of Player Personnel and his 16th overall campaign with the organization. Sacks is primarily responsible for overseeing the team's scouting efforts as well as the compilation of information on players entering the NBA Draft and professional players throughout the world. Along with his scouting responsibilities, Sacks also helps oversee and coordinate scouting schedules and activities with the team's regional and international scouts and other basketball staff. In addition, Sacks assists in all facets of the day-to-day direction of the basketball operations department including player trades and free-agent acquisitions.

Prior to being named to his current position, Sacks served as Assistant Director of Player Personnel for the previous five seasons and before that worked in various capacities within the basketball operations department where he helped with draft and free agency information, video preparation, scouting reports, statistical and NBA Salary Cap analysis.

A 1990 graduate with a degree in Economics from UCLA, Sacks, his wife Tiffany and sons Jordan and Austin reside in Westwood.



FABRIZIO BESNATI DIRECTOR OF INTERNATIONAL SCOUTING

Fabrizio Besnati begins his fifth season as Director of International Scouting and his eighth overall season with the team. Besnati's responsibilities include the global scouting of both draft eligible players as well as potential free agents who are playing in professional leagues worldwide.

Besnati's professional career began in 1999 when he accepted the front office position of Assistant General Manager of Russia's St. Petersburg Lions while they were participating in Euroleague competition. After the experience with the Russian team, Besnati accepted a similar position with Austria's Traiskirchen Lions. He then moved on to work for the international sports agency, Interperformances, Inc., as a personnel consultant focusing on Eastern Europe and Africa.

Besnati grew up in Varese, Italy but attended high school in Prescott, Arizona in 1991. He speaks five languages and currently resides in Belgrade, Serbia.



TONY BROWN ASSISTANT COACH

Tony Brown enters his first season with the Clippers after last serving as an assistant coach with the Milwaukee Bucks during the 2007-08 campaign. This will mark Brown's third stint under Dunleavy, serving as an assistant coach on Dunleavy's staff in Portland (1997-2001) and as an advance scout in Milwaukee from 1994-97. This also is a return to the Clippers for Brown, who averaged 4.7 points in 22 games played for Los Angeles during the 1991-92 season.

Overall, Brown has spent 11 seasons as an NBA assistant coach, serving a three-year stint with the Boston Celtics (2004-07), before joining the Bucks in 2007. Prior to his three-years in Boston, Brown served as the lead assistant to Kevin O'Neill in Toronto (2003-04). He also spent two seasons as an assistant coach with the Detroit Pistons from 2001-03. During his time with the Pistons, the club registered back-to-back 50-win seasons, captured two Central Division titles, and advanced to the Eastern Conference Finals in 2003. Brown's time in Portland saw the Trailblazers make four straight post-season appearances as well as two consecutive Western Conference Finals appearances (1999 and 2000).

In seven seasons as an NBA player, Brown split his time with nine teams, finishing with career averages of 6.0 points and 2.1 rebounds per game in 359 games. His best statistical season came in 1986-87 with New Jersey when he averaged 11.3 points in 30.4 minutes per game. The University of Arkansas product was a fourth-round draft choice of New Jersey in the 1982 NBA Draft.

Brown also played in the Continental Basketball Association (Lancaster Lightning, Ohio Mixers, Kansas City Sizzlers and Albany Patrons) and overseas with Reggio Emilia in the Italian League (1992-94).



KIM HUGHES ASSISTANT COACH

Beginning his seventh campaign on the Clippers' bench is Kim Hughes, who came to Los Angeles after serving the previous five seasons with the Denver Nuggets. Hughes began with the Nuggets in 1998 as Director of Scouting and was subsequently named Director of Player Personnel. He moved to the bench as an assistant coach prior to the start of the 1998-99 campaign. Hughes also spent seven seasons with the Milwaukee Bucks, as head scout during the 1997-98 season and as a regional scout during the previous six campaigns. The 6'11" Hughes is a veteran of six seasons in the ABA and the NBA, beginning his career with the New York Nets of the ABA in 1975-76 where he was named to the All-Rookie First Team. Hughes signed with the Nuggets in 1978 and finished his NBA career in Cleveland in 1981. Hughes played collegiately at the University of Wisconsin from 1970-74 before playing professionally in Italy during the 1974-75 season. When his NBA career ended in 1981, Hughes returned to Italy, playing in Rome (Reggio Calabria) and Milan (Innocenti) until he retired in 1989. A native of Freeport, Ill., Hughes and his wife, Christy, are the parents of four children; Ryan, Megan, Maddison and Caitlin.



JOHN LUCAS ASSISTANT COACH

Also entering his first season on the Clippers' bench is NBA coaching veteran John Lucas. Lucas joins the Clippers after last serving as the Head Coach of the Cleveland Cavaliers from 2001-03. While in Cleveland, Lucas coached current Clippers Ricky Davis and Brian Skinner. Lucas came to the Cavs after working as an assistant coach for the Denver Nuggets for three seasons.

Overall, Lucas brings six years of NBA head coaching experience as he led the Philadelphia 76ers from 1994-96 and the San Antonio Spurs from 1992-94 with an overall NBA head coaching record of 173-258 (.401). While in Philadelphia, Lucas also served as general manager and vice president of basketball operations. As head coach of the Spurs, he led the team to a 94-49 (.657) record and two consecutive playoff appearances. In addition to his NBA coaching experience, Lucas was the owner and head coach of the Miami Tropics of the United States Basketball League (USBL) from 1992-93 and led the Tropics to a 38-9 record and two USBL championships. This past season he served as the head coach of the Nigerian National Team in the African Games.

Lucas began his 14-year NBA playing career during the 1976-77 season after he was made the first overall selection in the 1976 NBA Draft by the Houston Rockets. Lucas played for six different teams in his career, including Houston, Golden State, Washington, San Antonio, Milwaukee and Seattle and was named to the NBA All-Rookie team in 1977. In 928 career NBA games, Lucas averaged 10.7 points with 7.0 assists and is currently in 21st place among the NBA all-time assist leaders (6,454 assists).

In 1990, Lucas founded and became President of John Lucas Resources, Houston, Texas, a network of drug treatment programs aimed specifically at helping athletes.

A 1976 graduate of the University of Maryland, Lucas earned All-America honors in basketball and tennis in 1975 and 1976 as well as a bachelor's degree in Education. He later continued his studies at the University of San Francisco where he earned his masters degree, also in Education.

An accomplished tennis player, Lucas played for the U.S. National tennis team in the 1974 FIBA World Championship, winning the bronze medal as well as competing in World Team Tennis from 1976-79. Lucas returned to World Team Tennis in 2005 as the head coach of the Houston Wranglers and in 2006 served as the tennis coach for Lori McNeil while she was competing on the WTA.

He is also an inductee of the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame in basketball and tennis and is a board member on both the Houston Council for Alcoholism and the Cenikor Foundation.



FRED VINSON ASSISTANT COACH/DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PROGRAMS

Rounding out the coaching staff is Fred Vinson, who begins his second season as an assistant coach on Dunleavy's staff. Vinson's primary responsibility in his additional role as Director of Player Programs will be to serve as a mentor to the Clippers' younger players and ease their transition to life in the NBA. Vinson served as a player development consultant for the Clippers during the 2007-08 season.

On the court, Vinson played parts of the 1994-95 and 1999-00 season with the Atlanta Hawks and Seattle SuperSonics, tallying career averages of 1.3 points and 5.2 minutes per game. Vinson also averaged 3.3 points per game for the Clippers during the 2005-06 NBA preseason. A 6'4" guard out of Georgia Tech, Vinson helped win the 2002-03 CBA Championship as a member of current LMU and former Portland Trail Blazer coach Bill Bayno's Yakima Sun Kings. Vinson also gained experience abroad, playing professionally with SLUC Nancy in Nancy, France during the 2003-04 season.

JASEN POWELL HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

Entering his 11th season as head athletic trainer for the club, Jasen Powell brings with him a great deal of experience and is a familiar face in the Clippers' organization.

Powell was in his fourth year with the San Francisco 49ers as an assistant trainer when he made the move back to Los Angeles prior to the 1999-00 season. He spent the 1994-95 season with the Clippers as an assistant trainer, after spending three seasons as a student trainer at Cal Poly Pomona. Powell's previous experience also includes an internship with the Atlanta Falcons in their 1995 training camp.

Powell was a student-athlete, lettering three seasons as a point guard on the basketball team at Cal Poly Pomona after transferring from San Diego State. He graduated from Cal Poly Pomona with a bachelor's degree in Kinesiology and Health Promotion in 1995. In 1997, he created the Jasen Powell Health Promotion Scholarship.

The personally-funded scholarship is available to college-bound students in the Oakland Unified School District, who are interested in the field of health care. He is actively involved in the National Basketball Trainers Association and served as the trainer for the Eastern Conference team in the 2004 NBA All-Star Game. Powell is currently the Western Conference representative for the NBATA.

Powell is a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association and is a credentialed Performance Enhancement Specialist and a credentialed Corrective Exercise Specialist. He is also a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association. In addition, Powell is the first head athletic trainer in the NBA to have played collegiate basketball.

A native of Oakland, Calif., Jasen attended Bishop O'Dowd High, where he was an All-Northern California selection in basketball and competed against NBA player Jason Kidd (Dallas).

Powell, his wife Mia and son Aaron reside in Pasadena.



RICHARD WILLIAMS STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

Richard Williams begins his sixth season as Strength and Conditioning Coach for the Clippers after spending two seasons as the Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach for the Denver Nuggets.

Williams graduated from Tabor College in Hillsboro, KS in 2000 with a BA in Business, and an emphasis in Sports Management. While at Tabor, he was a starter on the basketball team and received First Team All-Conference recognition. He went on to receive an additional Bachelor's Degree from Western State College in Kinesiology/Health Promotions in 2002. While at Western State College, Williams volunteered as the Strength and Conditioning Coach for the Men's and Women's basketball teams. JOHAN WANG ASSOCIATE TRAINER/ ASSOCIATE STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

JoHan Wang enters his seventh season with the Clippers and his second as Associate Athletic Trainer/Associate Strength and Conditioning Coach. As the Clippers Associate Athletic Trainer, Wang is involved with assisting the Head Athletic Trainer with all aspects of the team's day to day medical needs, including the prevention, care and rehabilitation of athletic injuries.

Wang joined the Clippers staff in 2003 after two years at Stanford University where he served as the Associate Director of Athletic Training from 2001-03 and was named Director of Athletic Training Programs in the summer of 2003. He was responsible for supervising the health care of 800 varsity athletes in 34 NCAA Division I sports and was the Head Athletic Trainer for Men's Basketball from 2001-03. Prior to his tenure at Stanford University, Wang was an Intern Athletic Trainer for the Golden State Warriors Basketball Club (2001) and Assistant Athletic Trainer for Boise State University (1999-2001). 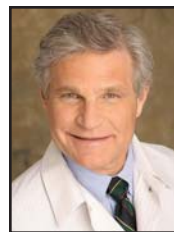
DR. STEVEN KREMS, M.D. TEAM INTERNIST

Additionally, Booth is Executive Director of the Los Angeles Clippers Foundation and has directed fundraising efforts exceeding \$5 million during her tenure. In her role as Director of Player Programs, she promotes positive personal, professional and social development of Clippers players assisting them to maximize their NBA career experience and prepare for their post NBA lives.

Booth's education and experience began in Canada. Born in Toronto, Ontario, and raised in Edmonton, Alberta, Booth attended the University of Alberta majoring in sociology. Booth enjoys traveling and resides in Los Angeles.

READ TO ACHIEVE

The Los Angeles Clippers READ TO ACHIEVE Program challenges children in elementary, middle and high school to take time out to read. Each participating child in elementary and middle school is asked to track the number of books they read and the minutes they spend reading. High school students are asked to track the number of books and minutes they spend reading to younger students. High school students also have the opportunity to participate in the Poetry Slam N'Jam by taking time out to celebrate the written word through a creative poem or rap. In addition, elementary and middle school students can participate in the Storybook Challenge by working as a team with their class to create a storybook in a quest to become Los Angeles Clippers Student Reading All-Stars. School visits by Clippers players, game tickets, books, bookmarks, t-shirts and grants are also incentives provided for the program. The goal of READ TO ACHIEVE is to build a lifelong love of reading in young people by providing greater access to books and technology while encouraging families and adults to read regularly with young children.

FAST BREAK TO FITNESS

The Los Angeles Clippers Fastbreak to Fitness Program challenges children in elementary and middle school to charge their way to a healthier lifestyle through exercise and nutrition. Each participating student is asked to track the number of minutes they spend doing physical activity each day. The physical activity can be anything from walking, running, jogging, skipping, playing sports, jump roping, dancing, or anything that requires a student to get up and move. The top ten students who achieve the most activity minutes are recognized as Fastbreak to Fitness Squad Members. Schools that track the most Fastbreak to Fitness minutes receive a books and basketball clinic.



JUNIOR CLIPPERS

The Clippers and the Los Angeles City Department of Recreation and Parks have collaborated for eight seasons to promote the fundamentals of basketball, sportsmanship and athletics as an alternative to negative influences. In 2001 the program began with 750 participants from three centers: Normandie, Shatto and Queen Anne. Now in its ninth year, the program has grown to include 2,000 participants from ten centers. Participating recreation centers include Shatto, Normandie, Jim Gilliam, Rancho Cienega, Central Park, Roscreans, Alpine, Lake View Terrace, Robertson and Expo. The Junior Clippers program serves inner-city children, ages 5 to 15. The season runs from early January through the end of March, culminating with a championship tournament in early April. The Junior Clippers program also includes basketball and books clinics, one held at an inner city recreation center and one held at STAPLES Center prior to a Clippers home game. The Clinic Series promotes basketball fundamentals, literacy, health and nutrition, and sportsmanship.



CLIPPERS SUMMER CLINIC PROGRAM

The Clippers Summer Clinic program is a series of free basketball day clinics that take place during the summer months. Each clinic hosts 300 children ages 6 to 14 at different locations in greater Los Angeles. Over 6,500 youth have participated in the Clippers Summer Clinic program since its inception in 2006. Children in attendance receive instruction in the fundamentals of basketball, lunch, clinic t-shirt, gift bags and books courtesy of the Clippers Read to Achieve program.

DONALD T. STERLING CHARITY SEATS PROGRAM

Each season Clippers Owner, Donald T. Sterling donates game tickets to host children's charities and community groups. During the 2008-09 season over 550 organizations received in excess of 80,000 tickets for local children and their families. Community leaders from groups in attendance are invited to meet with Mr. Sterling pre-game and discuss their programs and community initiatives. Mr. Sterling has donated over 280,000 tickets to more than 2,000 community groups in the last seven seasons.

LOS ANGELES CLIPPERS CHAIRMEN

The Los Angeles Clippers Chairmen wheelchair basketball team enters its eighth season as part of the Clippers family. The Clippers teamed up with the National Wheelchair Basketball Association to sponsor the Clippers Chairmen. Formerly the Pasadena Big Wheels, this second division NWBA team finished the 2008-09 season ranked sixteenth in the nation. The Clippers Wheelchair players are not only chairmen of the court, they also participate with Clippers community outreach to children directing youth to a positive life path. In 1998-1999 the first-ever NWBA All-Star Game for its NBA affiliated teams was held in New York as part of All-Star Weekend. Six of the last seven NWBA All-Star Games featured a representative from the Clippers Chairmen. The National Wheelchair Basketball Association (NWBA), along with the Canadian Wheelchair Basketball Association (CWBA) offers the NBA a 50 year history of organized and competitive sports for people with disabilities. Wheelchair basketball began as rehabilitation for soldiers returning from World War II and was formalized as a competitive sport in 1948, just one season after the NBA.

PLAYERS ZONE TICKET DONATION PROGRAM

In conjunction with the Los Angeles Clippers Foundation, Clippers' players host groups of children and make it possible for them to join in the fun and excitement of watching a Clippers game. All children receive goody bags, a chance to watch the pre-game warm up courtside and the opportunity to meet their player/host up close and personal.



TEAMWORK AT THE TABLE

The Clippers team up every November with corporate partners to serve hot Thanksgiving meals complete with all of the trimmings to members of the Bread & Roses Cafe in Venice. Immediately following the Bread & Roses Cafe serving, players and staff reconvene at the St. Joseph Center to distribute clothing, food baskets and turkeys to families. This event has served thousands of homeless individuals and provided thousands of families with food and clothing during the holiday season.

Clippers season ticket holders have the opportunity to give back to the community by donating their unused game tickets to children. The community relations department utilizes donated tickets to provide at risk youth with the chance to attend a Clippers home game.

BIG BUDDY NIGHT

The Los Angeles Clippers Foundation works with corporate sponsors to provide tickets for youth to attend a Clippers home game. This is a very special night for thousands of children in Southern California. Big Buddy Night is an opportunity to bring the excitement of the NBA to kids who would otherwise not be able to attend a professional sporting event.

FOUNDATION MISSION

The Los Angeles Clippers Foundation exists to foster and support community outreach programs and activities with positive educational, civic, environmental and humanitarian values that benefit and enhance the quality of life primarily for children in greater Los Angeles. To meet these commitments, the foundation will seek, accept and donate funds and in-kind items to support community outreach programs and initiatives of local children's charities and organizations.



The Los Angeles Clippers Foundation is a nonprofit entity established in the summer of 1994 to increase the Clippers' support to the surrounding communities. Its donations

are primarily focused toward non-profit organizations benefiting children located in Southern California. Monetary donations are made, as are tickets, merchandise and autographed memorabilia. The foundation will continue to team up with sponsors, community organizations and media outlets in providing quality community programs, scholarships and other opportunities for the youth in and about the greater Los Angeles area.



DONATION PROGRAM

The Clippers Foundation is committed to promoting positive educational, civic, environmental and humanitarian values through community outreach programs. Donations are primarily focused toward non-profit organizations benefiting children located in Southern California. In addition to monetary donations, tickets, merchandise and autographed memorabilia are also given. The foundation will continue to team up with sponsors, community organizations and media outlets in providing quality community programs, scholarships and other opportunities for the youth in and about the greater Los Angeles area.



CHARITY GOLF CLASSIC

This exciting day of golf provides season ticket holders, sponsors and the general public an opportunity to interact with their favorite Clippers players while raising funds to benefit the Los Angeles Clippers Foundation and local children's charities. The 2008 Charity Golf Classic generated over \$130,000 with a portion of the net proceeds donated to Feed The Children.



CHARITY BASKETBOWL CHALLENGE

The Charity BasketBowl Challenge is an interactive day of bowling where the entire Clippers team bowls with corporate partners and Clippers fans of all ages. The BasketBowl Challenge has raised in excess of \$900,000 since inception

with proceeds benefiting the Clippers Foundation, Childrens Hospital Los Angeles, local children's charities and the Division of Hematology-Oncology, Mattel Children's Hospital.



NBA CARES

NBA Cares is the league's global community outreach initiative that addresses important social issues such as education, youth and family development, and health and wellness. The NBA, its teams, and players support a range of programs, partners, and initiatives that strive to positively impact children and families worldwide.



As part of the league's mission to demonstrate leadership in social responsibility, NBA Cares reaches communities through philanthropy, hands-on service, and legacy projects. Since the program's October 2005 launch, the league, players, and teams have raised more than \$110 million for charity, provided more than one million hours of hands-on service, and built more than 425 places where kids and families can live, learn, or play in communities around the world.
